During the summer break we elaborately remodeled and renovated the school and prepared the school premises to be safe, homely and welcoming for the children.






The school building, classrooms, floors, and toilets were renovated, and painting work was carried out. All outdoor playground equipment was overhauled, and the electrical equipment was serviced.

## We are proud to have an 11th grade!

The opening of the eleventh grade after approval by the school board and after receiving the necessary licenses from the Ministry of Education was very lucky for everyone. So our previous tenth graders can stay at our school. If we then - God willing - get the second secondary level next year, we can offer training for the blind from kindergarten to university entrance qualification.



#### Corona Protection Measures I





In view of the corona epidemic, we are making every effort to comply with all corona protection regulations. We thoroughly clean and disinfect. The temperature of all children and employees is measured daily. Dispensers are available everywhere to disinfect hands.

So we were ready to start the new school year.



But after just 17 days of school the government decided that all schools had to close.

## A Happy, but Short Period

It could have been a good school year! After intensive planning and preparation, the new school year began. We had all adjusted to the epidemic and were just getting used to the security measures. Here are pictures from the short time in which we thought we could have a successful school year despite Corona.



When the children arrive in the morning, their hands are first disinfected. The children wear masks and keep their distance in the classroom.

## Communication on dealing with Corona, protective measures



Schoolchildren are being informed about Corona precautions, classes have been divided and the children are set far apart.



The headmistress informs parents and teachers about the necessary methods to prevent the transmission of the virus as well as about distance learning with the program "MS Teams".

Our children need school as a community, and professional, individual care is so necessary! At home with distance learning, this is as good as impossible, especially for disabled children. After the state decided that distance learning should be done, things became very difficult for parents, students and teachers. The pandemic hits the school in many ways, and the workforce works to the point of exhaustion. A hygiene concept had to be developed and implemented. School children and parents had to be trained. To protect everyone, all wear masks and adhere to the rules of distance.



Media had to be purchased for distance learning and the teaching staff had to be trained. Certificates for successful advanced training in the "MS Teams" program (right) As if that weren't bad enough, nine teachers are currently infected and have to work from home.

### Distance computer learning, no volunteers



Teachers apply their new computer skills, work together on programs, and connect with the children who need to study at home.



The fact that volunteers are not allowed to enter the country due to the epidemic is particularly stressful. In recent years, volunteers have been able to help teachers in the classes by accompanying the blind and severely blind. In addition, the volunteers always helped with the German-language correspondence and the newsletter. That also explains why the newsletter is coming to you later this year. We apologize for that. From November 30th, according to the Jordanian government, the disabled children should go back to school. We are doing everything we can to master this situation.



Our children need school as a community and professional, individual care so much! This is extremely difficult at home with distance learning, especially with disabled children. The pandemic hits the school several times, and the community is at the end of its tether. The school and its staff do extraordinary things in terms of strength and finances. In addition to the daily work, the hygiene measures have been developed and implemented, the school has been equipped with electronic media and further training has been carried out. In addition, nine teachers are currently infected and work from home. One teacher tested positive even after three weeks.


